HIGHLIGHTS

Training: Heritage Monitoring Scouts at Randell Research Center

On Thursday November 10th, volunteers from the Randell Research Center/Pineland met with Florida Public Archaeology Network's (FPAN) southwest region to learn about FPAN's Heritage Monitoring Scouts (HMS) program. The HMS program is a citizen science initiative to empower communities to verify archaeological site information, and to monitor sites that are at risk due to inclement weather events and sea level rise.

The HMS workshop was led by Rachael Kangas, MA, RPA, Public Archaeology Coordinator for FPAN southwest, and Sara Ayers-Rigsby, MA, RPA, Director of FPAN Southeast/Southwest regions. Cindy Bear, Coordinator for Programs and Services, at the Randell Research Center, facilitated the workshop. Twelve volunteers attended, and have subsequently monitored archaeological sites at various locations throughout Lee County.

Assistance to Local Government and the Division of Historical Resources: ARM Training

In December, Rachael Kangas and Sara Ayers-Rigsby assisted the FL DHR and Florida State Parks in Archaeological Resource Management (ARM) training for land managers. This course is designed to teach land managers from various agencies throughout the state to recognize and care for archaeological resources at their facility. During this two-day course, Kangas and Ayers-Rigsby assisted DHR staff in presenting information about archaeological resources in southwest Florida, and logging information into FPAN's HMS database.
